
## St. Hilary School March 2019

The students qualified by receiving Superior ratings at the St. Hilary School Science Fair held February 6. A total of 23 projects qualified to advance.

Students in grades K-8 completed MAP testing in January, which is the second round of this progressbased testing for the school year. The final MAP testing session will take place in April and May. CAT

testing for grades 3, 5 and 7 will begin March 11 and is slated to continue through March 22. Please be sure your child has a good night's rest each night and a wholesome breakfast each morning during testing. Students will also need to have several sharpened #2 pencils - please ask your child if his or her supplies need to be replenished. Thank you for avoiding scheduling appointments during testing.

Third quarter interim reports were issued on February 8, and the quarter ends on March 15. Students should be working on achieving goals set for the remainder of the quarter and the year. Third quarter report cards will be available on Gradelink on March 21. When the fourth quarter begins on March 18, students will again be permitted to wear uniform shorts but turtlenecks will no longer be permitted. As a reminder, there is no school on March 8 due to a teacher inservice day. Spring Break will begin on April 19 and school will resume on April 29.
