With Christmas Break just a few weeks away, this is the perfect time to think about some books your child might like to read independently or with you during the time away from school. A book would be a great Christmas gift! Nothing fills a chilly winter afternoon or evening quite like a good book by the fire! We would like to offer some book suggestions that might be wonderfully received if they end up under your Christmas tree!

Wintry weather arrived early this year, so please be sure your child has a coat, hat, gloves or mittens, and boots for recess. Also, a special reminder for our 6th, 7th and 8th grade students that during the school day, only the school uniform sweatshirt or 3/4 zip pullover are permitted. Hoodies and outerwear may not be worn in school. As needed, school closings or two-hour delays will be announced by our One Call Now telephone notification system, as well as on Fox 8 news, the school website, Facebook, and by email. School closing or delay information will be issued via One Call Now as soon as a determination is made to cancel school. Because many of our families rely on public school transportation and Latchkey at the end of the day, it is highly unlikely that school would ever be dismissed early due to worsening weather conditions once students are safely in the building. However, because so many of our students do ride public school buses from Copley, Highland, Revere, and Woodridge, closings in these districts, as well as other factors, may impact our decision to cancel or delay school in the morning, or even the night before. Thank you for your patience as we consider the many factors that help us to make the best decision to keep our students and staff safe.

Winter brings with it the cold and flu season, so please take a minute to read the health policy in our Family

Handbook. Please call the school office by 9:30 a.m. if your child will be absent or late, and request homework at that time. Please note that we cannot guarantee homework to be ready for pick-up before the end of the school day, particularly during peak times of illness. Students should be symptom-free for 24 hours before returning to school after an illness. Your cooperation helps us to maintain a safe and healthy environment for all students.
