As you know, the students will have four Fridays off from school this year. The teachers are in school on these days, learning about the new Common Core State Standards. The new Diocesan Math Curriculum,


which was rolled out in the spring, reflects the standards and many of you have probably noticed a change in the rigor of what is expected in Math at St. Hilary School. The new English and Language Arts Curriculum will be rolled out after the first of the year. An initiative from the state superintendents and governors, the Common Core State Standards create a single set of standards for all of the states. The goal of the standards is to ensure that all students are college and career ready upon graduating from high school. Previously, all of the states had different standards. Ohio, for example, currently ranks 25th of the 50 states in student achievement. Implementing the Common Core State Standards will have radical implications for the state of Ohio, as we will have to raise the bar in many areas. Some of the shifts that will occur in the English Language Arts



area are: an increase in reading nonfiction and informational text, reading, writing, and speaking grounded in evidence, and regular practice with complex text and its academic vocabulary. In Math, "rigor" is the key word that is used to describe the shifts. The Math standards represent a shift from the focus on skills and procedures of the past decade toward a conceptual understand-

ing of mathematics, balancing practices with content and asking students to explain mathematical reasoning. Also, digital literacy is a huge component in every area of the Common Core State Standards. The way teachers teach will also change. Classes will be more student-centered than teacher-centered. Active teaching, which challenges students to think deeply and critically, will prepare our students for the future. Our iPad initiative has come at an opportune time. Another key shift stated over and over again in the Common Core State Standards is that our students need to be digitally literate and competent. They need to know how to

use technology to acquire knowledge, analyze and evaluate information, explore, draw conclusions, and test theories. More importantly, they need to know how to apply what they learn to real-life scenarios. The new tests being developed for the Common Core State Standards are completely digital and require that students as young as kindergarten have knowledge of a mouse and keyboard. We welcome the opportunity to help our students become even better prepared for the challenges of high school, college and career as we implement these new, more rigorous standards.



The second quarter is underway and will continue through January 10. As you update your calendars for 2014, please take advantage of the online school calendar at www.st-hilaryschool.org to assist in planning your schedule. The calendar is updated regularly, so be sure to check the school website frequently for the latest information on school events. Please note that school will be closed Wednesday, November 27 through Friday, November 29 in observance of Thanksgiving. Looking ahead, our last day of school before Christmas break will be Friday, December 20, with school resuming on Monday, January 6.

Thank you to all parents who so willingly support our school by volunteering through Parents' Association committees, School Board, or in the classroom. Your time and effort are greatly appreciated and vital to the success of our school.
